Evidence of the Resurrection

"But in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect." 1 Peter 3:15.

In this verse, the Greek word for "reason" is apologia. Which means to 'offer factual evidence in favor of a claim.' It is where we get our term "apologetics", which means "reasoned arguments or writings in justification of something, typically a theory or religious doctrine." Or simply put, defending our faith in Jesus Christ. In his second epistle, Peter states: "For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we were eyewitnesses of His majesty (2 Peter 1:16)." The New Testament was NOT written to create or invent an event; Christianity is not based on a set of writings. There were thousands of Christians even before a single line of the New Testament was written. Acts 2:41 records that after Peter preached at Pentecost, "there were added that day about three thousand souls." Christianity is not based on a set of writings trying to create an event. It's the other way around! Christianity originated from an event, the Resurrection. The New Testament is recording factual, historical details.

But what factual evidence can we as Christians give in defense of the Resurrection?

Dr. Frank Turek (American Christian author and apologist) gives six E's of testimony for the reliability and historicity of the New Testament. And if the New Testament was written to record an event, this also defends the event in which it records. I will expound on his six lines of testimony:

Early Testimony

There is good reason to believe that all of the New Testament was written prior to AD 70. In response to Jewish rebellion, the Romans destroyed the Temple in Jerusalem in AD 70. The Temple was the center of Jewish culture and society for almost a thousand years (and the Tabernacle before that). But, not ONE New Testament writer mentions this historic event; all who were Jewish except for Luke.

Also, we know that Paul was beheaded in Rome in AD 67. The book of Acts details the ministry of Paul, which ends with him in Rome on house-arrest. Why did Luke not record the death of Paul? At the time of writing, Paul was still alive. Luke would not have left out the culmination of Paul's life and ministry. The book of Acts is part two of a series Luke wrote, the first part being the Gospel of Luke. So, the Gospel of Luke had to have been written before the book of Acts, scholars believe around AD 58-59. The Gospel of Matthew or Mark are considered the first Gospels written, as early as AD 45; which is at most 15 years after the Resurrection.

Eyewitness Testimony

The New Testament was written very close to the actual events it records. This also prohibits the possibility of myth and legend to creep its way into the narratives, skewing the historical facts. How? If the New Testament recorded anything that did not correspond with reality, there were hundreds of eyewitness (still alive at the time of writing) that could have condemned the author's authenticity. In the beginning of his Gospel, Luke informs Theophilus that he took his information about the life and ministry of Jesus from eyewitnesses. "...Just as those who from the beginning were *eyewitnesses* and ministers of the word have delivered them to us (Acts 1:3)." There have been over 140 details in the Gospel of John and the book of Acts that have been identified as eyewitness details, or details that only someone present at that moment could know.

Also, this next point provides both early and eyewitness testimony: The Gospels were written after almost all the letters of Paul, whose writing ministry probably began in the late 40's. Most of Paul's major letters

appeared during the 50's. Were the early Christians convinced of the Resurrection of Jesus? One of the most important creeds seen in Scripture is 1 Corinthians 15. If Jesus was crucified as early as AD 30, Paul's conversion was around two years later (AD 32). Immediately from his conversion on the road to Damascus, Paul met with a Christian named Ananias and some other disciples. His first meeting with the apostles in Jerusalem would have been around AD 35. At some point along this short time line, Paul was given this creed, which had already been formulated and was being used in the early church. (See Acts 9 and Galatians 1). Further, even one of the criteria for New Testament canonicity if the book was written or approved by an apostle. Every New Testament book was approved by eyewitnesses to the life, ministry, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Excruciating Testimony

All of the disciples died brutal deaths due to their faith in Jesus Christ. Scripture does record such persecution; Stephen (not one of the apostles) was stoned to death in Acts 7. James (John's brother) the son of Zebedee, was executed by Herod about 44 AD (Acts 12:2).

Peter and Paul were both martyred in Rome about AD 66, during the persecution under Emperor Nero. Paul was beheaded. Peter was crucified, upside down at his request, since he did not feel he was worthy to die in the same manner as his Lord.

Andrew went to the "land of the man-eaters," in what is now the Soviet Union. Christians there claim him as the first to bring the Gospel to their land. He also preached in Asia Minor, modern-day Turkey, and in Greece, where he is said to have been crucified.

Thomas was probably most active in the area east of Syria. Tradition has him preaching as far east as India. They claim that he died there when pierced through with the spears of four soldiers.

Philip possibly had a powerful ministry in Carthage in North Africa and then in Asia Minor, where he converted the wife of a Roman proconsul. In retaliation the proconsul had Philip arrested and cruelly put to death.

Matthew the tax collector and writer of a Gospel, ministered in Persia and Ethiopia. Some of the oldest reports say he was not martyred, while others say he was stabbed to death in Ethiopia.

Bartholomew had widespread missionary travels attributed to him by tradition: to India with Thomas, back to Armenia, and also to Ethiopia and Southern Arabia. There are various accounts of how he met his death as a martyr for the gospel.

James the son of Alpheus, is one of at least three James referred to in the New Testament. This James is reckoned to have ministered in Syria. The Jewish historian Josephus reported that he was stoned and then clubbed to death.

Simon the Zealot, tradition goes, ministered in Persia and was killed after refusing to sacrifice to the sun god.

Matthias was the apostle chosen to replace Judas Iscariot (Acts 1:26). Tradition sends him to Syria with Andrew and to death by burning.

John is the only one of the company generally thought to have died a natural death from old age. He was the leader of the church in the Ephesus area and is said to have taken care of Mary the mother of Jesus in his home. During Domitian's persecution in the middle 90's, he was exiled to the island of Patmos. There he is credited with writing the last book of the New Testament—Revelation. An early Latin tradition has him escaping unharmed after being cast into boiling oil at Rome. Why would these men die for a lie? Or did they truly see the risen Savior?

Expected Testimony

In his book "The New Evidence That Demands A Verdict", Josh McDowell says: "The Old Testament contains over three hundred references to the Messiah that were fulfilled in Jesus." If one searches out the various Messianic currents in the Old Testament, and compares the resulting picture with the life and work of Christ; the ancient predictions point to Jesus and the kingdom which He established. Socrates had no one to foretell his birth. Buddha had no one to pre-announce him and his message or tell the day when he would sit under the tree. Confucius did not have the name of his mother and his birthplace recorded, no were they given to men centuries before he arrived so that when he did come, men would know he was a messenger from God. But, with Christ it was different. Because of the Old Testament prophecies, His coming was not unexpected.

Prophecies from OT: The Messiah would be resurrected (Psalm 16:8-11), The Messiah would bring in a new covenant (Jeremiah 31:31), The Messiah would be forsaken and pierced, but vindicated (Psalm 22:1-31; Zechariah 12:10), The Messiah would be the rejected cornerstone (Psalm 118:22-24), The Messiah would be born of a virgin (Isaiah 7:14), The Suffering Servant (Isaiah 52:13-53:12), The Messiah would be preceded by Elijah the prophet (Malachi 4:5-6), The Messiah would come riding on a donkey (Zechariah 9:9), The Messiah would be called out of Egypt (Hosea 11:1), The Messiah would be betrayed for thirty pieces of silver (Zechariah 11:12 -13), The Messiah would be born in Bethlehem (Micah 5:2), The Messiah would be called a Nazarene (Isaiah 11:1, 53:3), The Messiah would perform signs of healing (Isaiah 35:5-6).

Embarrassing Testimony

Authors claiming to write history are unlikely to invent embarrassing details about themselves or their heroes. Since the New Testament documents are filled with embarrassing details, we can be reasonably certain that they are telling the truth.

Notice that the disciples frequently depict themselves as dim wits. They fail to understand what Jesus is saying several times, and don't understand what His mission is about until after the Resurrection. Their thick-headedness even earns their leader, Peter, the sternest rebuke from Jesus, "Get behind me Satan!" (Matthew 16:23)"

After Jesus asks them to stay up and pray with Him during His greatest hour of need, the disciples fall asleep on Jesus not once, but twice! Then, after pledging to be faithful to the end, Peter denies Christ three times, and all but one of them run away; but the women are the ones who were at the cross (Matthew 27:55-56).

The scared, skeptical disciples make no effort to give Jesus a proper burial. Instead they say a member of the Jewish ruling body that sentenced Jesus to die is the noble one—Joseph of Arimathea buries Jesus in a Jewish tomb (which would have been easy for the Jews to refute if it wasn't true). Two days later, while the men are still hiding, the women go down and discover the empty tomb and the risen Jesus.

Who wrote all that down? Men—some of the men who were characters in the story. Now if you were part of a group of men trying to pass off a false resurrection story as the truth, would you depict yourselves like this? Or were they recording the truth? Finally, anyone trying to pass off a false resurrection story as the truth would never say the women were the first witnesses at the tomb. In the first century, a woman's testimony was not considered on par with that of a man. An invented story would say that the men had discovered the empty tomb. Yet all four Gospels say the women were the first witnesses.

Extra-Biblical Testimony

Lastly, we have 10 ancient documents by non-Christian authors that date within 150 years of Jesus, that give a story line congruent with the New Testament. I won't spend a lot of time here, but just to say—if the New Testament and the Resurrection narrative is false and made-up, why would non-Christian historians deem it necessary to record it? Other sources that mention Jesus outside of the Bible include: Josephus (Jewish historian), the Roman historian Cornelius Tacitus (c. AD 55–120), Gaius Suetonius (AD 69–died after 122) the chief secretary of the Roman Emperor Hadrian (who reigned AD 117–138), and Pliny the Younger (AD 61/62–c. 113) a Roman author and administrator. Also, not only does the Jewish Talmud mention Jesus, it mentions His crucifixion and the Jewish leadership's desire to stone Jesus (compare with John 8:58–59, 10:31–33, 39). And notice that it even says Jesus was put to death at the time of the Passover—the very time the New Testament says the crucifixion occurred (John 18:28)!

So, what do we do with all this information? Just what Peter told us to do: honor Jesus Christ the Lord in our hearts, and always be ready to make a defense to anyone who asks us for a reason for the hope we have in Him, and in the promise of the Resurrection.

Be honest, be prayerful, forgiving, study the Word! Pastor Nick

<u>New Curriculum</u>

I wanted to take a few moments of your time to share about our new curriculum that we will be implementing in High Five this quarter. Effort was made this past year to look at a variety of curriculums for children's ministry.

The Crosswalk Kid's church environment offers a unique opportunity to provide instruction in a variety of ways, using different teaching methods and experiences. We have modified our teaching time/structure over the course of this past year. Our goal is to reach children with the Gospel at their age level. We are and always will be a "Work in Progress" when it comes to serving children and families.

In the transition time leading up to the new curriculum we have modified our rotation structure to help kids connect in smaller group settings with their peers. In addition, we have implemented a progressive instructional time so that kids advance their learning of our weekly point through rotations and begun incorporating the learning of Bible memory verses.

New Curriculum continued

Our future goal is to increase our teaching roster so that children can experience the following every Sunday:

- Corporate Worship & Prayer
- Small Group Time that may create and foster connections
- Facilitate unique learning/exploration time in God's word
- Introduce key scripture verses for application within the context of each week's lesson.
- Provide a weekly challenge to children to respond to what they have learned

The Curriculum we have selected is called D6 from Randall House. You can look up their website at <u>https://d6family.com/d6curriculum/</u> regarding their values and doctrinal statement. It is called D6 as a reference from Deuteronomy 6:5-9 where it talks about parents being the primary spiritual leaders of their home. There are many avenues that will help us partner with parents in this role. If you visit the D6 website, you will see the available resources to help accomplish this. Over the course of this year we plan to implement strategies that will best utilize the tools available for the mission at hand.

Our goal will be to navigate and apply the new curriculum and resources in a timely fashion that is practical. We have always enjoyed the partnership and support in ministry that exists among parents/volunteers. Your feedback and implementation of ideas is always a benefit and strength of ministry.
